Seventy pre-sea trainee ratings completed their training and the formal passing out ceremony was held on 17th November, 2023. All the ratings scored high scores in the Department of Shipping examination leading to the issue of NOC for CDC. All required ancillary courses for joining a ship was also conducted and completed on schedule.

In view of the prevailing situation the ceremony was limited to the trainees and faculty members of IMA. The Commandant of the academy was the chief guest. Formal parade by the passing out ratings was the main event of the event. The Commandant, in his brief speech to the ratings lauded their performance of the trainees throughout their training period and expressed his gratitude to the instructors who had worked tirelessly for the trainees. 


Key Performance Indicators 2023

RED SEA CHAOS CAUSING GLOBAL OIL BUYERS TO SHOP LOCAL



The global oil market is looking increasingly local as militant attacks in the Red Sea and surging freight ratesmake supplies from closer to home more attractive.

A slump in tanker traffic through the Suez Canal is spurring the beginnings of a split, with one trading region centered around the Atlantic Basin and including the North Sea and the Mediterranean, and another encompassing the Persian Gulf, the Indian Ocean and East Asia. There's still crude moving between these areas — via the longer and costlier journey around the southern tip of Africa — but recent buying patterns point to disconnection.

Across Europe, some refiners skipped purchases of Iraqi Basrah crude last month, according to traders, while buyers from the continent are snapping up cargoes from the North Sea and Guyana. In Asia, a jump in demand for Abu Dhabi's Murban crude led to a spike in spot prices in mid-January, and flows from Kazakhstan to Asia are down sharply.

Crude loadings from the US to Asia, meanwhile, plunged by more than a third last month from December, ship-tracking data from Kpler show.

The fragmentation will not be permanent, but for now it's making it tougher for import-dependent nations like India and South Korea to diversify their sources of oil supply. For refiners, it limits their flexibility to respond to rapidly changing market dynamics and could eventually eat into margins.

"The pivot toward logistically easier cargoes makes commercial sense, and that will be the case for as long as the Red Sea disruptions keep freight rates elevated," said Viktor Katona, lead crude analyst at data analytics firm Kpler. "It's a tough balancing act choosing between security of supply and maximizing profits."

Oil tanker transits through the Suez Canal were down 23% last month compared with November, Kpler said in a note released Jan. 30. The drop was even more pronounced for liquefied petroleum gas and liquefied natural gas, which fell 65% and 73%, respectively.

In product markets, flows of diesel and jet fuel from India and the Middle East to Europe, and European fuel oil and naphtha heading to Asia have been most affected. Asian prices of naphtha, a petrochemicals feedstock, hit the highest in almost two years last week on fears it would become tougher to source it from Europe.

The sheer magnitude of this man-made marvel left me in awe, especially as a Bangladeshi officer, realizing that I was part of shaping

maritime history.

The sea trial became an immersive experience, offering insights and challenges beyond the realm of regular sailing. Participating in equipment tests, understanding their operations, and contributing inputs from a seafarer's



perspective became our daily routine. The shipyard's meticulous attention to our suggestions, noting down each input and responding to them, underscored the collaborative spirit driving this endeavour forward.

Our stay at the shipyard for one and a half months was a period of continuous learning and refinement. As we witnessed various tests and offered inputs for improvement, the vessel evolved into a testament to collective effort and dedication. Finally, on December 23rd, 2024, 'ONE INTELLIGENCE' was delivered to us at Takaikamishima Anchorage a momentous occasion that marked the culmination of months of preparation and hard work. Setting sail to China for her maiden voyage, 'ONE INTELLIGENCE' made history once again on departure from Singapore by setting a record for the most number of TEUs carried by a vessel a testament to her technical advancement and the collective effort of the team.

None of this would have been possible without the unwavering support of KLSM and 'Haque and Sons.' Their commitment to promoting Bangladeshi officers and engineers to the world's best shipping companies, opening new horizons for us, has been unparalleled. Once again, 'Haque and Sons' orchestrated every detail to ensure Bangladeshi officers could be part of this historic moment.

Inauguration of LNG Bunkering Simulator (IGF Code) at BMTI by Director General of Shipping

on 23rd August 2023



With the increasing demand of reducing carbon emission and NOx/SOx gases at sea, the industry is now shifting towards cleaner fuel source. Amongst the cleaner fuels are Natural gases and low flash point fuel. The IGF Code becomes mandatory (since 1 January 2017), for ships using gases or other low-flashpoint fuel and introduces new training requirements for seafarers

working onboard these ships.

There are Basic and Advance levels of training requirements for those who work on ships subject to the IGF Code. For endorsement in advance level certification, a candidate must complete at least one month of approved seagoing service that includes a minimum of three bunkering operations on board ships subject to the IGF Code, where two of the three bunkering operations may be replaced by approved simulator training on bunkering operations.

As always, Bangladesh Maritime Training Institute (BMTI) is at the forefront of adopting new training requirements and technologies. To facilitate the Advance training requirement, BMTI procured and installed state-of-art LNG Bunkering Simulator accredited by DNV, which is inaugurated by Director General of Shipping on 21st August 2023. We are the first and only Maritime Institute in Bangladesh till date to install IGF Bunkering Simulator to facilitate the training requirements. We obtained the approval for Basic and Advance Training for Ships subject to the IGF Code in September 2023 and since then BMTI was conducting both basic and advance course for all seafarers.





IGF CODE-LNG BUNKERING SIMULATOR ROOM AT BMTI

LNG Bunkering Simulator has been developed to provide training as per the performance standards given in Section A-I/12, Section B-I/12 of STCW Convention. This simulator comprises of six work stations, it can simulate various processes listed below related to LNG bunkering and LNG consumption/pressure maintenance:

- a) Tank preparations Drying, inerting, gassing up, cooldown
- b) Simulate ESDS test
- c) Connection and pressure test of liquid hose and inerting of the hose.
- d) Bunker transfer from Terminal, truck and barge
- e) Post bunkering stripping, inerting and disconnection
- f) Usage of LNG for running generator sets and/or main propulsion unit
- g) Burning of excess BOG in GCU

PANAMA CANAL RESTRICTIONS HIT US EAST AND GULF COAST PORT VOLUMES



U.S. container imports experienced a 9% decrease in November 2023 compared to October 2023, according to the latest U.S. imports report from Descartes Systems Group.

This decline was most pronounced in East and Gulf Coast ports, which are starting to feel the impact of drought-driven Panama Canal restrictions. While this monthly decrease is significant, it is in line with the monthly reductions typically observed at the end of previous years, Descartes noted.

In November 2023, U.S. container import volumes reached 2,099,408 twenty-foot equivalent units (TEUs). Compared to November 2022, TEU volume showed a 7.4% increase, and it was up by 10.4% compared to November 2019, before the pandemic. Import volume growth over the first eleven months of 2023 is within 4.0% of the same period in 2019

Imports from China also continued to decline, although at a slightly faster pace than the overall numbers. Imports from China declined by 11.7% in November 2023 compared to October 2023, and were down 21.9% from the August 2022 high. China represented 37.3% of total U.S. container imports in October, a decrease of 1.1% from October and down 4.2% from the high in February 2022.

The impact of the Panama Canal drought started to impact U.S. container import volume at East and Gulf Coast ports for the first time in November. According to Descartes' report, the port of Houston experienced a significant decline of 26.7% in November. Similarly, top East Coast ports also saw greater decreases in volume compared to the overall national trend. These decreases helped top West Coast ports gain market share over top East and Gulf Coast ports. The top five West Coast ports increased their import container volume share to 43.1%, while the top five East and Gulf Coast ports decreased to 42.0%.

The impact of the Red Sea attacks is feeding through to oil prices via higher transport costs, which is encouraging refiners to go local where they can. Rates for Suezmax crude tankers from the Middle East to Northwest Europe have jumped by around half since mid-December, Kpler said. Global benchmark Brent crude is up around 6% over the same period.

Meanwhile, the delivered cost of oil to Asia from the US, where production is surging, rose by more than \$2 a barrel over a three-week period in January, according to traders involved in the market.

"Diversification is still possible, but it comes at a higher price," said Giovanni Staunovo, a commodity analyst at UBS Group AG. "Unless it can be passed onto the end consumer, it would cut into the margins of refineries."

The situation in the Red Sea isn't expected to lead to a long-term rearrangement of oil flows, but it's also difficult to see a resolution of the conflict in the near term. Instead, there's a significant risk of more disruptions, particularly after the Houthi strike on a tanker carrying Russian fuel late last month. That attack was noteworthy as the Iranian-backed militant group had previously indicated that Russian and Chinese ships wouldn't be targeted.

The report notes that the situation could worsen as the Panama Canal Authority plans to further reduce the number of daily transit slots in the upcoming months due to severe drought exacerbated by this year's strong El Niño.

The December update of logistics metrics being tracked by Descartes shows a decline that is consistent with seasonal import patterns, but also indicates that recent improvements in global supply chain performance have stalled.

"November has traditionally been a weaker month than October, and while the decline is steep, it is consistent with previous performance," said Chris Jones, EVP Industry at Descartes, commented on the situation. "The impact of the drought in Panama is finally being felt, with volumes at Gulf Coast ports, particularly the port of Houston (-26.7%), being significantly lower than the overall decline. East Coast ports also experienced a significant decrease."

HSL attends ISWAN maritime conference and AGM Helsinki seminar hears from seafarers and experts on maritime recruitment crisis

On 16th November, ISWAN hosted its annual seminar in Helsinki in partnership with the Finnish Seamen's Service, with the theme: 'Addressing the maritime recruitment crisis: Seafarer wellbeing in a changing world'.

Representatives of stakeholders from across the maritime sector – including

shipping and ship management companies, unions, P&I clubs and welfare organisations – came together at the Scandic Marina Congress Center to hear both experts and seafarers themselves share their knowledge and insights on how the sector needs to address the recruitment and retention gap whilst ensuring seafarers' welfare is a priority.

The seminar was opened by Tiina Tuurnala, CEO of the Finnish Shipowners' Association. The first panel of the day was formed solely of seafarers, who shared what they saw as the key challenges and ideal solutions to the recruitment and retention crisis, laying the foundations for the rest of the seminar. They spoke about how there is still much to love about seafaring as a profession but there is a great deal that companies can do to make working at sea an attractive and sustainable option for a wider group of prospective seafarers.

The second session focused on 'Fair work', with speakers followed by a panel exploring practical solutions for the maritime sector to bridge the gap between current working conditions and seafarers' aspirations. Attendees heard about the International Transport Workers' Federation's (ITF) Flags of Convenience Campaign and insights from the first two years of the



Sustainable Shipping Initiative's Code of Conduct. Maritime recruitment marketplace TURTLE highlighted the benefits of innovative digital solutions for crewing, and the World Maritime University shared the conclusions and ways forward from its recent research into the effects of COVID-19 into seafarer retention. The panel discussed that the industry needs to achieve parity between shore and sea in terms of salary, entitlements, rights and support, and issues with contract length and hours of work and rest need to be addressed.

In the third session of the day on 'Inclusive culture', experts discussed how the maritime sector can provide a safer and more inclusive environment for all seafarers. Attendees heard about Maersk's Cultural Transformation and the Global Maritime Forum's Diversity at Sea pilot. The co-founders of NeurodiversAtSea.org spoke about the benefits of neurodiversity and the importance of inclusivity, and seminar attendees ...

heard from King's College London about how the future of remotely operated ships can be made inclusive. The panel raised the point that training and targets are not necessarily the solution to bringing about lasting structural and behavioural change – the industry needs to commit to building environments that are psychologically safe so that people can truly be themselves at work.

In the final session of the day, a panel discussed the impact of changing technologies within the maritime sector on seafarers' wellbeing. ISWAN's recent research on the impact of decarbonisation technologies on seafarers points to the negative impact on workload and stress levels, which is exacerbated by the lack of standardised regulations. The panel emphasised the importance of including seafarers in a more meaningful way in decision-making discussions about technology can enhance their lives, including understanding and adapting to the different learning needs of different groups of seafarers.

Key messages from the seminar included the importance of listening to seafarers and turning what they tell into practical actions; understanding that the challenges driving the recruitment and retention crisis cannot be generalised across industries, ranks and demographics; and the need to make structural changes to address the root causes of the recruitment and retention crisis and ensure that seafaring is a safe and rewarding profession for prospective seafarers.





SHIPPING INDUSTRY ISSUES REVISED GUIDANCE FOR NAVIGATING SOUTHERN RED SEA



A group of prominent shipping associations have released revised security guidance for navigating the Southern Red Sea and Gulf of Aden in response to a series of attacks by the Iranian-backed Houthis against international shipping from Yemen.

The new guidance was issued by BIMCO, Cruise Lines International Association (CLIA), International Chamber of Shipping (ICS), International Marine Contractors Association (IMCA), INTERCARGO, INTERTANKO, and the Oil Companies International Marine Forum (OCIMF).

The Houthis claim to target ships with affiliations to Israel, the US, and the UK. However, the accuracy of their information and the validity of their claims regarding the affiliations of attacked vessels have been called into question.

Therefore, all ships transiting this area are advised to remain vigilant due to the potential for collateral damage from unintended strikes. The main threats to vessels include anti-ship missiles, anti-ship ballistic missiles, water-borne improvised explosive devices (WBIED), and drones, especially when transiting near the Yemeni Red Sea coast.

"Maintaining lookouts during the entire passage, regardless of timing, is necessary," the guidance states.

The updated guidance highlights the need for a comprehensive ship and voyage-specific threat and risk assessment, taking into account any additional advice from the ship's flag state before passing through the area.

Ship operators calling at Israeli ports should limit information access due to potential use by Houthi forces. Vessels acquired from Israeli-associated companies should update systems to reflect current information.

Both AIS-on and off ships have been attacked, and while limiting AIS data or switching it off could make a ship harder to locate, it is unlikely to prevent an attack. The guidance advises ship owners and operators to regularly evaluate risks to their ships and plan routes accordingly, considering the consequences of turning off sensors such as AIS, LRIT, and radars.

The guidance also advises against following Houthi instructions to divert to Houthi-controlled ports and provides direction regarding suitable waiting areas if a decision is made to postpone transit through the Southern Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden.

The guidance recommends that owners and operators consider vessel hardening measures, including the use of BMP5, but cautions on the use of armed guards. "Caution should be taken when managing their employment and rules of engagement should consider the risk of escalation," the guidance states.





"Safety Tip"



5 Basic Marine Safety Tips For Any Vessel

1. Ensure you have the proper safety equipment on board

Having the right safety equipment on board your vessel could quite literally mean the difference between life and death during an emergency. Many vessels are already required to meet the safety standards set out by treaties like the 1974 International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea (SOLAS), which mandates or recommends essential maritime safety equipment and procedures.

2. Conduct regular equipment maintenance and checks

Having the right safety equipment is just the beginning. You should schedule regular maintenance, inspection, and upkeep sessions for your equipment to ensure that it is working as it should. Sudden mechanical failure is still a possibility, and you don't want to realise this only when you're already out at sea. Keep detailed checklists and records on board your vessel at all times so that you can have peace of mind before casting off.

3. Choose your crew wisely

Picking the right crew is key to ensuring a trip or operation goes smoothly. If you are anticipating rough weather conditions or a long-haul operation for example, you should select crew members who have the relevant experience and appropriate credentials to handle the vessel throughout those conditions.

4. Keep communication lines open

Once you have your trusted crew on board, it's important to keep lines of communication open. This encompasses communication with authorities and other crew members back on the ground, as well as between crew members on the vessel itself. Clear communication helps you minimise human error, and can prevent accidents that could lead to severe consequences.

5. Set a good example for your crew

As the captain, you are the de facto leader of your crew and your crew members will be taking their direction of how to act from you. This will extend from day-to-day situations to unexpected emergencies where your firm guidance is necessary to keep everyone safe.

Coconut Curry Shrimp

This easy Thai-inspired coconut curry shrimp is loaded with vegetables and gets tons of flavor from prepared green curry paste and coconut milk. The sweet and spicy sauce gets sopped up by a bed of hot brown rice. Serve with a crunchy Asian slaw to round out the meal.

Prep Time : 30 mins Additional Time : 5 mins Total Time : 35 mins Servings : 6

Yield : 6 servings

Ingredients

- ♦ 2 tablespoons canola oil
- → 3 tablespoons green curry paste
- ◆ 1 tablespoon finely chopped garlic
- ◆ 1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh ginger
- 1 ½ teaspoons finely chopped lemongrass
 1 (15 ounce) can light coconut milk, well shaken
- ♦ 1 cup reduced-sodium vegetable broth
- ♦ 1 ½ teaspoons fish sauce
- ♦ 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- ♦ 6 ounces snow peas, cut into 1-inch pieces
- ♦ 1 cup matchstick-cut carrots
- ♦ 2 pounds medium shrimp, peeled and deveined
- ♦ ½ cup packed fresh Thai basil or Italian basil, thinly sliced
- ♦ 3 cups hot cooked brown rice

Directions

- Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add curry paste, garlic, ginger and lemongrass; cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture is aromatic and dry, about 2 minutes. Add coconut milk and broth; stir to loosen any browned bits from the bottom of the pan. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce heat to medium-low; simmer, undisturbed, for 5 minutes.
- Stir fish sauce and cornstarch in a small bowl. Stir into the curry mixture; bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium-low; simmer, stirring occasionally, until the sauce begins to thicken, about 5 minutes.
- 3. Add snow peas and carrots to the curry mixture; return to a boil over medium-high heat. Boil, undisturbed, until the vegetables are tender, about 2 minutes. Add shrimp; cook, stirring occasionally, until the shrimp turn pink and are cooked through, about 2 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in basil. Serve over rice.
